



In today's lesson you are going to think about colours.


Do you have a favourite colour?

Warm Colours


sunny, warm and cosy things.

Colours, feelings and emotions


We are going to think of four different colours for today's task.

Lesson 2 - Wassily Kandinsky

You are going to be learning about a famous artist called Wassily Kandinsky this week.

You will learn about his life, his paintings and the style of his art work.

Wassily Kandinsky



Wassily Kandinsky was a Russian painter. Many people think he was the first abstract artist.

All about Wassily Kandinsky

(1866 - 1944) Russian



Wassily Kandinsky was born in Russia, in 1866. When he grew up, he worked as a teacher at a university but it didn't make him happy.

When he was 30, he left his job and went to art school. He found art school easy and was very good at his studies.

Kandinsky thought a lot about what colours mean and how they make people feel. He believed that colours had a soul.

All about Wassily Kandinsky

(18<mark>66 - 1944)</mark> Russian



He was the first painter to stop painting pictures of things and instead paint just using colours and shapes. He believed that this let him paint honestly about his feelings.

Often Kandinsky would listen to music while he painted and try to paint what he heard.

Other painters learned a lot from Kandinsky's ideas.




Creating a picture in the style of Kandinsky


- Step 1 Draw lots of different shapes and lines in pencil.
- Step 2 Colour in the shapes with water colour pencils or colouring pencils.
- Step 3 If you have used water colour pencils you can use water and a paintbrush and create a background wash.
- Step 4 When it has dried, draw over all of the shape outlines and lines with a black felt tip.
